**You MUST inform us of any illness/infection your child may have.**

Always seek medical advice from you GP, Pharmacist or NHS Direct if you think your child is unwell.

<b>Cold &amp; Coughs</b>	Usually ok to attend
<b>Oral Thrush</b>	Usually ok to attend
<b>Teething</b>	Usually ok to attend
<b>Chest Infections</b>	Usually ok to attend (unless medication is prescribed)
<b>Ear Infections</b>	Usually ok to attend (unless medication is prescribed)
<b>Croup</b>	Usually ok to attend
<b>Fever/Temperature</b>	24 Hours
<b>Sickness &amp; Diarrhoea</b>	48 Hours
<b>Allergic Reactions</b>	GP recommendation
<b>Chicken Pox</b>	5 Days or (when all spots are scabbed over)
<b>Measles, Mumps &amp; Rubella</b>	8 Days
<b>Hand, Foot &amp; Mouth</b>	5-7 Days
<b>Scarlet Fever</b>	5 Days
<b>Conjunctivitis</b>	24 Hours
<b>Ring Worm</b>	48 Hours
<b>Thread Worm</b>	Treatment for whole Household, usually ok to attend.
<b>Impetigo</b>	48 Hours
<b>Head Lice</b>	Hair treated and tied back
<b>Whooping Cough</b>	48 Hours

Where a time is stated, this is the length of time a child must be kept away from Nursery once administration of medicine has begun.

If a child is prescribed medication (other than general pain relief), your child should not attend Nursery for the first 24 hours to ensure that no side effects or reactions occur. Final decisions are at the discretion of Nursery management.
